NOTES ON EVERGREEN SHRUBS

- * Junipers of any type are not allowed to be planted in Condo 5 due to their possibly hosting the Pear Tree Trellis Rust disease that can afflict the lovely that can afflict the lovely Chanticleer Pear trees that grace our streetscapes.
- * We do not recommend plantings of white or "swamp" cedars as patio hedge material as they require frequent shearing in order to give them a proper hedge shape. If they are not trimmed regularly, (far too much work!) they will look shaggy and untidy--not a look we strive for in our Condo! The colour is also inferior to that of the Emerald Green cedar which we recommend as a patio privacy planting and which is a much better looking and better behaved plant all around.
- * Evergreen shrubs are the "bones" of any garden, adding needed year-round structural elements and/or unique accents to your garden.
- * As in the general notes at the beginning of the Illustrated Approved Plant List, we recommend "dwarf" evergreens. Specimens from the following species: cedar, fir, hemlock, larch, pine, spruce, chamaecyparis or any other evergreen (but not all listed below) in dwarf or very slow growing varieties, are recommended for our modest gardens.
- * Finally, the evergreen shrubs listed in the following tables are but a few of the many types available in nurseries. However, those listed here are either already planted in our gardens by the builder, or are generally known and recommended by the Landscape Committee.
- * As to the care of evergreens, their needs are simple and predictable:
 - o Enough room to grow to show off their beauty and form;
 - o Consistently moist, rich soil during the growing season;
 - o Well-drained soil; they do not like wet feet!
 - o Watered well in late fall;
 - o Protection from drying winter winds; they love to be protected by an insulating layer of snow.
