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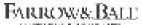

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#### A MESSAGE FROM OUR COUNCILLOR MORE FROM MAURICE



#### BALLANTRAE PARK, AURORA ROAD

Those who frequent this park will have noticed two significant changes. The town recently completed the full removal and reconstruction of the four tennis court surfaces. The sub-grade material was replaced with new engineered fill. New asphalt, new coloured court surfacing, perimeter drainage, nets and posts were included in the court improvements.

In addition, a field house has been constructed and the official opening will coincide with the start of the 2018 tennis season.

#### INTEGRITY COMMISSIONER MATTER

Local and regional papers have reported on this Whitchurch-Stouffville matter in great detail. It is my opinion that town staff and the people who deal with them must always act in a respectful manner. Elected officials must set an example and be held accountable just as any other group. It was for this reason I voted at Council that the recommended sanctions against the Mayor, including the docking of his pay, put forward by the Commissioner, be enforced. Her extensive investigation included what she considered the Mayor's inappropriate actions when dealing with past and present staff and other politicians over the past number of months.

It was unfortunate the taxpayers had to bear the cost of the investigators and the Integrity Commissioner, but the report presented to Council indicated clearly that there had been a breach of what should be expected behaviour by an elected official. Penalties have been assessed and I trust we can put this unfortunate series of distractions behind us and move forward.

#### **BALLANTRAE GATES PLAZA**

It appears that the construction of the long-awaited plaza at the corner of Highway 48 and Aurora Road will be well under way by the end of 2017. Land clearing started in the fall for the 35,000 square foot, two-storey complex to be known as Ballantrae Gates. Plans call for 25,000 square feet on the main floor and 10,000 square feet on the second. The upper floor will contain medical and general offices. The main floor is scheduled to have major tenants complementary to our community needs.

On Main Street, Stouffville, a large plaza is also presently under construction and should open for business late summer 2018. Longo's and East Side Mario's are the first confirmed tenants. Announcements of a further assortment of tenants will have been made by the time you are reading this article.

#### TRAFFIC AND ROAD ISSUES

Among the priorities I had as Ward 2 Councillor was to work on traffic conditions on Aurora Road throughout Ballantrae. This road is governed by the Region of York and therefore there were many different levels of controls through which to navigate. However, along certain sections the speed limit was reduced from 80 km to 70.

The Aurora Road/Ninth Line intersection has historically been noted as one of the most hazardous in all of York Region. My continuing efforts in bringing this before Regional authorities were recently rewarded when a flashing caution light was installed over this intersection.

Hopefully these two changes will help, however we will see further area changes in 2018 and beyond.

With the town portion of the sidewalks being completed along Aurora Road, I have been able to have the cost for the installation of street lighting in this area included in the 2018 town capital budget.

Also in 2018 we should finally see a long-requested advanced green signal added to the traffic lights at the Aurora Road and Highway 48 intersection.

#### LEGENDARY FIRE

I am always amazed at how wonderful and generous the BGCC residents are. When tragedy struck with the Legendary Trail fire, BGCC came together once again and provided financial assistance in excess of \$27,000 to the three families involved. Hopefully by the time you are reading this, life will be back to some semblance of order for these folks.

# Travelling in Troubled Times BY KEN MIYAUCHI



In 2015, the U.S. State Department reported that there had been 11,774 terrorist attacks in 92 countries. When planning our 2017 vacation, we thought about the fact that there is no safe place to travel. There are, however, safer places, so we chose Spain and Portugal where there hadn't been any terrorist activity since 2004. We returned from Spain in June and a terrorist attack in August killed 15 persons and injured 129 in Barcelona.

So, what are we to do – stay at home? In September, a deranged person stabbed an Edmonton policeman and injured four others. What about the U.S.? A lone gunman killed 59 and injured 527 in Las Vegas in October, while another shooter killed 49 in Orlando in June, 2016.

We are not going to let terrorists and deranged gunmen rule our lives. We will continue to travel, but we must be smart in our planning and vigilant during the trips.

It is easy to find the countries that have the most terrorist incidents. Are these the places to avoid? Some would say that these are, at least temporarily, the safest places because of the heightened security. According to the U.K. newspaper, the *Daily Star*, the seven safest places to travel are Costa Rica, Bhutan, Fiji, Laos, Japan, Belize and French Polynesia.

In assessing a destination, visit the Canadian Government website (travel.gc.ca) and heed all travel advisories. Consider travelling in low season when there are fewer tourists and avoid attractions and events with high congestion. A terrorist is always looking to wreak the most destruction and will pick crowded spots in crowded locales. If, after thoroughly examining a destination, you still feel uneasy, it's time to select another place. Feeling uneasy during your trip will ruin the entire experience.

Once you have determined your destination, examine the refund policy of your tour company, travel provider and hotels. Be aware of any deadlines and be ready to act should you need to cancel. Obtain travel insurance (medical, trip cancellation, trip interruption) and read the clauses related to terrorism. Some policies will give you coverage, others not. If your policy has a "cancel for any reason" clause, you can cancel without fear of being denied coverage.

Before leaving, ensure that your family has your itinerary and contact information (tour company, hotels, insurance, yourself). Make photocopies of your passport, birth certificate, OHIP card, travel insurance, driver's license and medications. Give one set to your family and take the other set with you. Register your trip at travel.gc.ca to ensure you receive important travel advisories and communications.

Once your trip has begun and you are away from home, what do you do if the unimaginable occurs, such as an act of terrorism, a natural disaster or civil unrest? Local communications may be cut off or severely limited. The capabilities of local authorities (police, hospitals, travel providers) will be strained to the maximum and your needs may be lower priorities.

#### HERE'S A CHECKLIST OF THINGS TO CONSIDER:

- If the disaster occurs near you, check for injuries, apply first aid and seek help for seriously injured persons.
- □ Call for help. Do not assume that help is on the way.
- □ Assess the situation and seek shelter, leaving the disaster area as quickly as possible.
- □ If you are travelling with others, establish a meeting place in case you are separated.
- Contact your family and the Canadian authorities to let them know your status.
- Assemble a disaster supplies kit containing water, food, medications, first aid supplies, a change of clothing, a bedroll, battery powered radio, extra batteries and tools.
- Monitor local radio and television to understand the evolving situation and follow the instructions of local emergency officials.
- □ If you need to leave, contact your travel provider and Canadian authorities.
- □ Stay in a secure location until it is safe to leave.

The Wall Street Journal reported that the probability of being killed in a terrorist attack is the same as being killed by a tornado. While we're not likely to be involved in a disaster, vigilance is required in these troubled times.





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# African Tales & Tails BY ENID SANDERS



Dreams do come true. I have always been an animal lover and for years have wanted to visit Africa. I've watched so many *National Geographic* and other animal programs that I was beginning to believe that I really knew what Africa was all about.

I think that somewhere in my mind, I still pictured a continent completely overrun by all kinds of wild animals. I almost expected to get off the plane and be confronted by a cheetah.

Of course, all one has to do is disembark in Johannesburg to be brought back to reality. Africa consists of many countries and many big cities. In some ways my first glimpse was a huge disappointment.

But once we left Johannesburg and checked into our lodge adjacent to Chobe National Park, the Africa I had always dreamed about became a reality. Imagine, just outside the front door of our room was a family of warthogs. When I asked the attendants about them, I was simply told, "They live here. We do not bother them and they really do not bother us."

On our first cruise on the Chobe River we watched so many different birds and animals that I had only either read about or seen in zoos that I can hardly remember them all. Of course, watching an elephant and its mate swim across the river was amazing. Sitting safely in a boat, I took a picture of a crocodile with its mouth wide open almost seeming to smile at us, but it would probably have enjoyed us for dinner.

Riding in open Jeeps with only our guide, who did not have a gun, could have been frightening. What amazed me was that we were able to get so close to many of the animals yet they did not seem to be disturbed by us. Our guides told me that the animals in the game reserves have become accustomed to people and are fully aware that we are not a threat to them. While these animals are protected, their lives have been drastically altered by humans. It is so sad to think that there are still poachers looking to kill the endangered rhinos for their horns.

When you see a mother elephant and her calf peacefully feeding side by side with their entire

herd, you wonder how anyone could possibly want to harm them.

My first night safari was incredible. I could not imagine that we would be able to see anything. The guides of course know where to look as they have incredible eyesight. We actually watched a male and female lion mating. Nighttime is when many of the animals go out hunting, so there is a great deal of activity.

I was impressed with the respect that the guides had for maintaining the dignity of the animals. The people of Africa are very friendly, and, for the most part, they have a great love for their country and the animals that inhabit it.

The creatures that seemed to bother people were the baboons. They were very naughty. We were warned that if we were eating something and they wanted it, we should just give it to them. They are wonderful to watch but you must always remember that they are wild animals.

We did not see an inordinate number of stray dogs. The African National Council of SPCAs and many other private facilities offer low cost or free services to residents who require care for their pets. Many of these facilities also offer free pet education and training.

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# MAIN STREET BAKEHOUSE STOUFFVILLE by alison scowcroft



When I feel like a great cup of coffee and a homebaked treat, I head to the Main Street Bakehouse in the heart of Stouffville. It opened in February of 2016 and is owned by three families who are partners in the shop. I had the pleasure of meeting with Iain Lovatt (his mom Jessie is a Ballantrae resident) who is one of the partners and also a Councillor for Ward 5. He and his partners want to see Stouffville's Main Street thrive and this was one of the driving forces behind opening the Bakehouse.

They envision a place to gather, to meet friends, or to do some office work (free WiFi), rather than a traditional bakery. They want to encourage more people to come to Main Street and realize the pleasures of eating and shopping locally. When I asked about the inspiration behind the decor, Iain said it is a bit like bringing King Street to Stouffville. It is casual, warm and inviting.

The coffee is good, be it a traditional cup, an espresso, or a specialty brew. Iain and his partners taste tested a variety of beans from different roasters until they found the best. They use local roasters, one in Stouffville and another in Oakville, so you are assured a fresh and aromatic cup of java.

The Bakehouse employs three professionally trained bakers including Ella, Savannah and Christiana, who are young and just beginning their careers. Their creativity is apparent in all the delectable baked goods, such as blueberry-citrus glaze, double chocolate, brown sugar and morning glory muffins (a customer favourite says lain). Scones (lemon/cranberry, maple coffee and my favourite, bacon/cheddar), butter tarts (with or without bacon), croissants, bagels, squares and cookies are



all baked fresh daily with natural ingredients and no additives or preservatives. At lunchtime, they also offer soup and sandwiches.

Their catering menu can be found on their website, www.mainstreetbakehouse.com. They can also host private events for up to 30 people. They have a liquor licence and offer craft beer, wine and scotch. On Friday and Saturday evenings in the fall and winter, they stay open until midnight and offer charcuterie boards and cheese platters to enjoy with drinks. They take great pride in customer service, as is apparent when you walk in the door.

#### LIBRARY RESOURCES

Last spring, the Whitchurch-Stouffville Public Library staff outlined the process for accessing the electronic holdings of the library. The resource materials are extensive and the e-book collection is continually expanding. If interested, it would be advisable to visit the library, ensure you have a valid library card, and request hands-on assistance.

#### **APPLE NEWS**

1. Apple announced the introduction of new iPads the iPad Pro 9.7" and 10.5." These units are almost the same size as current models with the screen having been resized to fit the old format size with brighter screens, faster operation, better cameras and other enhancements.

2. The new iPhones 8 and 8Plus have been released; they are all glass units that are water and dust resistant with new faster retina HD display screens, improved cameras and battery life. The new iPhone X enhances all features and is due for release before Christmas.

3. The Series 3 Apple Watch has been improved to provide direct phone capability using your current phone number and messaging. You can connect directly to Siri to perform various tasks by voice command. You can stream over 10 million songs and it is waterproof.

4. Apple TV has been upgraded to 4K for any channel or Netflix that broadcasts 4K. The Apple TV App is included in all new Apple products or from the App Store. This allows access to programs anywhere at home or wherever you go.

5. The IOS 11 operating system is now standard in all Apple devices and brings many enhancements beyond speed and versatility.

- Siri has been enhanced providing a translation service, making wake-up calls, setting time reminders, calling anyone in your directory, sending messages and emails all by voice command.
- Apple Pay has been installed allowing you to use your device to pay for purchases or to transfer/ receive funds from friends or contacts. Any credit cards you might want to use must be included in the Apple Wallet, available free from the App Store.
- iMessage has been updated and messages are uploaded to the Cloud.
- The new Files App allows access to all files whether in the Cloud or in Dropbox.

6. Apple's new EarPods are Bluetooth and will connect to Siri and all devices. Sound quality is excellent and you can use voice command from your watch or even if your iPhone is in your purse or pocket. The battery lasts 24 hours and a fast recharger is provided.

7. Apple has announced its new HomePod (Siri) which will compete with Amazon's Echo Show (Alexa) and Google's Assistant. HomePod, seems to emphasize wide music accessibility and quality sound. At the time of writing, however, it seems deficient in other home controls and tasks that Amazon's Alexa provides (as reported in *Tips&Tricks*). It is expected that Apple will significantly expand the features of HomePod by the time of release. Amazon's Echo Show (Alexa) has a screen with Bluetooth capability and high quality sound and provides reminders, early morning highlights of the news, weather conditions and forecasts. Alexa will create to-do and shopping lists which you can access on your iPhone. It provides access to YouTube and to music from Spotify. It is compatible with the Nest thermostat system. Al suggested the kitchen as a good place to locate Alexa.

#### APPLE ACCESSIBILITY FOR DISABILITIES

Apple has prioritized its efforts to help all people use its products, particularly those with some kind of handicap or disability. These efforts are combined under the general category of "accessibility" and this is located on all iPhones and iPads in Settings (Select General, then go down the list to Accessibility. Tap it and you will be presented with a list of actions you may make to modify features on your device. These include: Vision options, Text options, Touch and Keyboard adjustments.)

In Settings you can also select Display & Brightness to set text sizes, bold text, and brightness.

Or, you can use Siri to do tasks by voice that otherwise you do by hand, For example, you can ask Siri to send a message or email someone in your contacts list; to remind you about something; to open up an app; and so on. #### **CHRISTMAS SUGGESTIONS**

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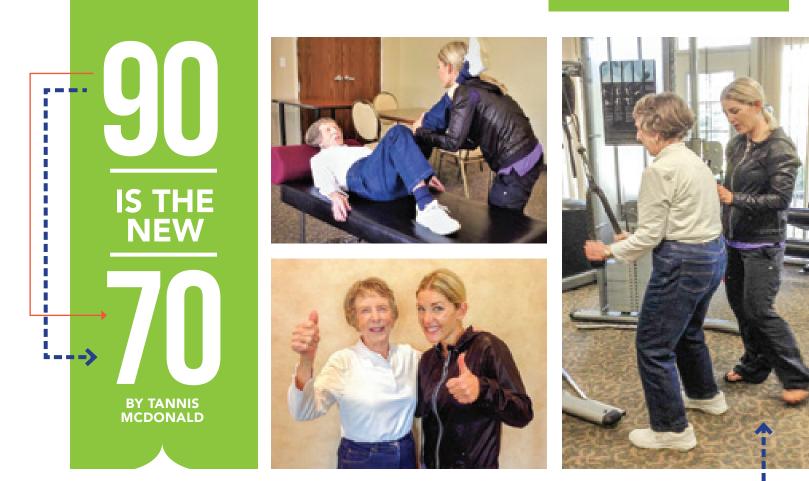
# Moments That Matter

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A few weeks ago, I visited the Ballantrae Golf & Country Club Recreation Centre and was motivated by what I saw. In the gym was a group of regulars going through their workout rituals, all sharing common fitness goals.

They were an inspiring group to watch, but it was the petite lady named Peggy (who happens to be my mother) on the treadmill who interested me the most. She had a big smile on her face and a look of determination in her eyes.

After Peggy finished her warm-up on the treadmill, Dayna Stoddart, the Wellness Director at the Recreation Centre, ran Peggy through a program of hand weights plus leg and arm presses.

After the session with the weights, it was determined that Peggy could move on to heavier weights the next week. In other words, she had gained some strength in her arms and was seeing some positive results--proof that improvement in strength can be made at any age, which in turn preserves and improves muscle mass.

All of Peggy's exercises were approached in a slow and methodical way. Apparently, there are more benefits gained in strength training with this slower approach. Dayna has also taught Peggy proper exercise forms and techniques to reduce any risk of injury.

After the gym session, they moved into another room with a stretching table. Dayna again moved

very slowly and began stretching Peggy's legs. These stretches are designed to help increase flexibility and overall range of motion.

Watching Peggy run through her fitness program was inspiring since she celebrated her 91st birthday in July.

Many instructors would have shied away from working with someone in this age group, but Dayna is a health and fitness professional with over 20 years' experience working with older adults. Her role as a Wellness Director is to promote healthy lifestyle choices leading to a better quality of life.

# Brain Health & Mindfulness Is Mindfulness your Missing Link? BY DAYNA STODDART



"Mindfulness is the psychological process of bringing and self-est

one's attention to experiences occurring in the present moment." Large population-based research studies have indicated that the practice of mindfulness is strongly correlated with greater well-being and perceived health.

This year's Active Aging Week previewed many topics to empower, engage and provide strategies, techniques and tools to help you flourish and thrive. These tools and techniques will not only "add life to your years, but also years to your life."

Here are some key messages that were delivered by the many experts throughout the seminars during Active Aging Week.

#### **REMAIN SOCIAL**

More than any other tool in the world of positive psychology, it is connection that contributes most to living a flourishing life. Face-to-face connections via Facebook, daily interactions and close relationships are key. Relationships strengthen brain connections. Social isolation reduces the number of neurons and dendrites in the brain.

#### PHYSICAL EXERCISE

Are you getting your 150 minutes? Moderate to vigorous aerobic activity 30 minutes per day, five days a week is recommended as is strength training two to three times per week. Both forms of exercise increase your heart rate, which in turn aids in increased circulation and oxygen to the brain as well as producing BDNF. BDNF stands for "brainderived neurotrophic factor." It is actually a protein, dubbed a master molecule and referred to as "Miracle-Gro for the brain" by Harvard psychiatrist, John J. Ratey, MD, author of *Spark, The Revolutionary New Science of Exercise and the Brain.* According to Ratey, BDNF is "a crucial biological link between thought, emotions, and movement."

**Daily aerobic exercise is best, but including intervals of sprints is even better.** It seems even a small amount of high-intensity exertion can have a profound effect on your brain!

BDNF binds to receptors in the synapses between neurons, increasing voltage (yes your brain is electric!), and improving signal strength. Inside the cells, it activates genes that increase production of more BDNF and other important proteins, as well as serotonin, the neurotransmitter vital for learning and self-esteem. Low levels of BDNF have been associated with depression and even suicide.

Being mindful during exercise/physical activity is the foundation to movement. It is about creating an awareness of how your body feels and where your body is in space.

#### HEALTHY DIET

Avoid processed foods, don't smoke, and limit sugar and alcohol intake (one drink per day for women, two drinks per day for men).

The Mediterranean diet is the best guideline to fuelling your body for health and longevity. Consume omega-3 fatty acids which are an integral part of cell membranes throughout the body. Health benefits include: lowered risk of cardiovascular disease and stroke, decreased blood pressure, prevention and treatment of peripheral vascular disease, postponement of cognitive decline, prevention of insulin resistance, as well as an aid in treating depression.

Adequate hydration is important for the body and brain to function efficiently. Our bodies contain about 50 to 65% water, and our brains contain approximately 75% water. Mild dehydration can increase anxiety and impair mood, memory and overall brain performance.

#### SLEEP

Better brain and physical health in older people are related to getting an average of seven to eight hours of sleep every 24 hours.

Too few health care providers consider sleep a serious health issue, despite the fact that chronic inadequate sleep puts people at higher risk for dementia, depression, heart disease, obesity, diabetes, fallrelated injuries and cancer.

While sleep disorders become more common with age, they often can be treated. Experts emphasize that people at any age can change their behaviour to improve their sleep.

#### CHALLENGE YOURSELF

The brain is plastic so we can learn new things at any age. Challenging the brain with new information and activities is strength training for the brain.

Brain Fitness Class "Staying Sharp" will be offered during the winter 2018 session on Wednesdays from 11 a.m. to noon.

The program focuses on all five areas of cognition: language and music, visual/spatial orientation, memory, critical thinking and computation.

#### **REDUCE STRESS**

Toxic stress releases chemicals that destroy neurons and dendrites in our brains. Neurons and dendrites are important because they hold our thoughts and memories. Worry sends many bad chemicals around the body and brain. Stress alone doesn't kill people how they think about it does. What is your stress mindset? Choosing positive emotions is good for your brain and body. Gratitude makes a difference. Sit, stand and walk with good posture to send a message of confidence to your brain. Research has shown that better posture changes our physiology and improves our self-esteem and confidence. It also improves your balance.

#### **MEDITATION**

Meditation can have a powerful effect on your brain/ body connection. Its benefits include reducing stress, calming the body and brain, improving physical health, boosting the immune system, improving cognitive function, enhancing your sense of compassion, helping you to focus, nurturing a positive attitude, and decreasing anxiety and depression.

Learning to Meditate classes will be offered in winter 2018 on Monday evenings from 8:00 to 9:00 p.m. and Saturdays from 3:30 to 4:30 p.m.

### CHOOSING WISELY BY JAN RICHARDS

**Did you know** that there is a national campaign called **Choosing Wisely** which discourages "unnecessary" diagnostic medical tests and treatments? Some procedures that are not supported by scientific evidence may expose patients to harm, lead to more testing to investigate false positives, and contribute to patient stress. Unnecessary testing can put increased strain on the limited resources of the health-care system.

**Choosing Wisely** Canada is a campaign to help physicians and patients engage in healthy discussions about making smart and effective choices to ensure high-quality health care. The Canadian Medical Association, in partnership with over 30 national medical specialty societies, is presently engaged in this campaign. All Canadian provinces and territories have endorsed this cost saving strategy.

On the television news last June was a story of the rescue of three racing yachts which hit a storm in the North Atlantic while on a race from the UK.

This brought back memories of a passage we had made in 1982. During a four-year sailing sabbatical, I sailed across the North Atlantic in June in a 39-foot ketch from Bermuda to the UK with my wife Monica, and our son James.

We left Bermuda in good weather and aimed north of the direct route to stay in the Gulf Stream. The Gulf Stream runs at two knots, which does not sound fast, but it is 48 miles per day—and in the right direction. The route we chose was based on charts showing the average weather and wind for each area, and we were in an area showing the percentage of storms to be zero for that time of year.

Progress for the estimated 18-day voyage was good. We kept a watch system so that one person was in charge for a four-hour spell leaving the others to relax, sleep, eat or whatever. At night, it was usual to look out carefully, over 360 degrees, then relax for ten minutes and look out again. As we moved further north, it was quite chilly and the protection from the screens in the cockpit was welcome.

One night while James was performing his usual check, he was alarmed to find a large vessel very close. He started the engine to change course to avoid a collision. The other vessel never saw us. I only saw it when I was awakened by the engine starting and I looked through the porthole. The sight of the stern of that vessel, much too close, is seared in my memory.

Collision at sea is quite a remote possibility when you are not in a regular sea lane. On later voyages, we had radar, which included an automatic proximity alarm. For this voyage, GPS had not been invented and small radars were not available. On the day we met the storm, the weather changed without warning from a day so pleasant that I opened the porthole in the rear cabin. But a sudden weather front came through. The temperature dropped and the wind picked up, rapidly getting stronger. Soon we reefed the mainsail and wound in the genny, but then had to reef again until only a portion of the sail was exposed.

By this time we were huddled in the cockpit with the wind screaming and waves towering over us. At this point, the mainsail blew out with a bang and was shredded, flapping wildly.

James and I, already in full weather suits, struggled to go on deck, carefully attaching our harnesses to the boat because to be washed overboard was to be lost. There was no way of turning back. We started the motor and Monica, at the wheel, tried to head into the wind to help us lower the remnants of the sail.

We were progressing with difficulty as the violent motion of the boat made it hard to hold on and lower the sail. I looked up and then said to James, "Look behind you and you will see a sight you will never forget."

There was a monster wave, higher than the mast, curling over to break. And break it did, right on top of us, so the whole boat was under water. Monica lost sight of everything and when the water cleared, we were gone. She envisioned herself sailing the Atlantic alone.

In fact we had been knocked off our feet and were lying on the deck, between the cabin top and the life lines. We were able to stuff the shredded main into a bag and we then wound in the genny, leaving a tiny amount exposed so that we were moving and able to steer.

As the waves continued to rise and with the wind screaming and blowing across the vessel, the motion was so violent that we opted to go to bare poles. We removed everything we could from the deck, streamed a long rope off the bow to try and keep us head to the waves, and then went below with everything battened down.

In the cabin, Monica made something for us to eat. And a word of appreciation here, Monica did everything we did, and managed to produce some food. We wedged ourselves into corners and waited for the storm to blow itself out.

The noise was horrendous, the motion erratic and violent, and every now and then we would be thrown with a crash as we fell off a wave. We likened it to being a cork caught in a washing machine.

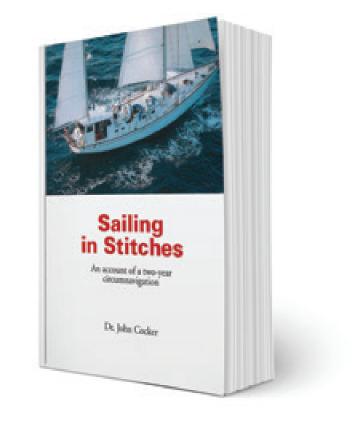
Our vessel was sturdy and strong, built when fiberglass was inexpensive. Modern vessels have hulls that are much thinner, and those racing boats which were damaged in June were not designed to handle storms.

It was almost two days before the wind settled enough, and although the waves were still horrendous, we were able to set the genny. We could then begin sailing, running down the huge waves and stopping when we were in the troughs.

We were navigating by sextant and after four days, were still unable to get a fix, so had no idea where we were. I knew we were approaching the Azores, but we needed to know, before we ran into land.

In the height of the storm, I had used the radio to see if any vessels were near. I spoke to one, but never saw it. I asked about wind speed, and he said his anemometer only went up to 65 knots, and the needle had been against the stop for hours so that the wind speed would have been over 140 kph. That is our story of our storm at sea. In my seven years of ocean sailing, it was probably the worst.

The three race yachts that had to be rescued in 2017 were designed for high speeds over smoother waters. They broke up and were dismasted, resulting in a very expensive rescue mission involving ships and planes, for which I hope they did not have to pay!



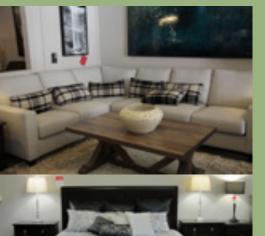

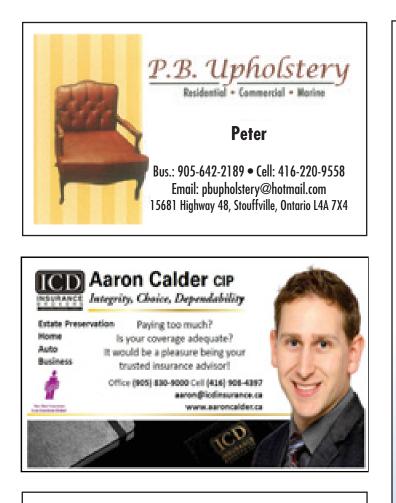

Bake at 450° F for 20 minutes or until thoroughly cooked.

# CHICKEN AND BROCCOLI CASSEROLE

This was a hit at the Ballantrae Summer Games Volunteer Appreciation Evening.

1 head broccoli

- 5 to 6 boneless chicken breasts
- 2 cans cream of chicken soup
- 1 cup mayonnaise
- 1 tbsp lemon juice
- 1 cup grated Cheddar cheese
- 1/2 cup breadcrumbs
- 1 tsp curry powder

Steam the broccoli about a minute. Arrange in the bottom of a 9" by 12" greased pan.

Bake the chicken breasts approximately 30 minutes at 300 ° F.

Cut the chicken into bite size pieces and arrange over the broccoli.

Combine the soup, mayonnaise and lemon juice and pour over the broccoli and chicken.

Sprinkle the shredded Cheddar over top followed by the breadcrumbs to which you have added the curry.

Bake 350° F for 30 minutes.

#### CLASSIC BEEF BOURGUIGNON from karen clark

- 2 lb stewing beef, cubed
- 2 cups red wine, preferably Burgundy

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup vegetable oil for sautéing

**5 strips** of bacon, cut into 1-inch pieces

2 cups onions, coarsely chopped

2 cups carrots, peeled and coarsely chopped

- 1 cup celery, finely chopped
- **2 tbsp** fresh garlic, finely chopped
- 1 tbsp fresh thyme, finely chopped
- 1/4 tsp ground cloves

**1 cup** all-purpose flour for dredging, placed in a large bowl

- 2 tbsp tomato paste
- 2 bay leaves

Cold water

**1 Ib.** Yukon Gold potatoes, boiled in their skins until tender, cooled and cubed

1 tbsp butter

1 **Ib** brown button mushrooms, cleaned, trimmed and halved

**10 oz** bag of pearl onions, boiled and peeled as per package directions

Salt & freshly ground pepper

1. Stir beef and red wine together in a baking dish and marinate in the refrigerator overnight or for at least 8 hours.

2. Preheat oven to 325° F

3. Remove beef from refrigerator. In a large Dutch oven heat 1 tbsp oil over medium-high heat. Add bacon and sauté until browned, about 5 minutes. Remove bacon from pot and set aside in a medium bowl.

4. Add the onion, carrot and celery to the same pot, sauté over medium-high heat until lightly browned, about 5 minutes. Add garlic, thyme and cloves and sauté for 1 minute, remove from pot and set aside with bacon.

5. Drain beef from marinade, reserving marinade. Dredge beef in flour to coat. Shake off excess flour.

6. Heat 1 tbsp oil over medium-high heat. Work in batches and brown beef until browned on all sides, adding more oil as needed. When cooking the last addition of beef, stir in tomato paste for the last minute.

7. Add vegetables, bacon, beef, bay leaves and marinade to the pot, add enough water just to cover. Simmer over low for 5 minutes and scrape up brown bits from bottom of pot. Cover pot with lid and cook in oven for 3 hours. For the last half hour of cooking add potatoes.

8. Heat butter in a sauté pan over medium-high heat. Sauté mushrooms until golden. Add pearl onions and cook for 5 minutes longer. When the beef has finished cooking add mushrooms and onions to pot, stir, season to taste and serve.

**Note:** Make sure to do the full marinating time, as this is what makes the beef exceptionally tender. A slightly chilled Burgundy wine goes nicely with this winter meal! Serves 6

# LIGHTING UP LEGENDARY: A "FROSTY" TALE



Last December folks walking or driving along Legendary Trail were enchanted by the sight of 63 jolly snowmen standing at attention on 63 front lawns. These short-term inflated visitors to Ballantrae lit up not only our neighbourhood but also our spirits. The brainchild behind this winter wonderland was Bob Ross who many of you know from Pacemaker's fame. At first, Bob's wife, Diane, was an unwilling accomplice to his street scheme, but thanks to Bob's enthusiastic exuberance (he described himself as a "monomaniac with a mission"), the idea snowballed and most everyone got into the Christmas spirit.

As you read this issue, the snowmen are again happily ensconced along Legendary Trail and the festive tradition continues into its second year.

#### HOW DID YOUR SNOWMAN SCHEME START?

I was in Canadian Tire after Christmas 2015 and came across some half-price (\$39) inflatable

snowmen. I thought it would be fun to get a couple of neighbours to put them on their lawns so I bought a few. The first folks I approached were Eric and Ann Adams. Eric and I had a Scotch and eventually we convinced Ann to go along with the plan. Neighbours Gerry Di Donato and Marie thought it was a great idea.

Soon I had six takers, so I went to Canadian Tire and bought eight. In the meantime, Gerry sent an email blast to about 25 residents on Legendary Trail suggesting they all put snowmen on their front lawns. Most agreed.

I explained my vision to Ron Cairns, owner of the Canadian Tire store at Woodbine and Major Mackenzie. He offered me a discount on all remaining inventory and gave me a list of other stores in the area that had snowmen in inventory. So...I bought \$2500 worth of inflatable snowmen and stacked them in the spare room. Diane was not amused.

#### **THEN WHAT?**

When we came back from New Brunswick in November 2016 I would go trundling down the street with a snowman, knock on a door, often be invited in for a drink and explain my vision. I was able to sell 50 snowmen to neighbours, went back to Canadian Tire and bought 15 more. In hindsight, instead of knocking on 65 doors I would book a room at the Recreation Centre and make a group presentation. Sounds like time to celebrate.

Folks were getting excited so Diane and I decided to have a Nibble and Nip party at our house on the night of December 1 before heading outside to "light up Legendary." I offered prizes to the man and woman who wore the ugliest Christmas sweater. After cocktails we made our way down Legendary Trail and ceremoniously plugged in each one.

#### **DO THE SNOWMEN HAVE NAMES?**

Yes, that was another part of the idea. We ruled out "Frosty." I named ours Hank...as in Hank Snow! We created a name registry for each snowman so we can welcome them back year after year.

#### WERE THERE ANY PROBLEMS?

Oh yes. We created detailed instructions for setting up the snowmen, complete with a diagram for positioning. But the snowmen were no match for Ballantrae weather. On the morning of December 2 the blustery northerly winds posed a threat to our newly inflated friends. I recruited John Blainey, Ron Morrison, Ron Brewing and Doug McIntyre to help secure them. But during ensuing windy days the cords that came with the snowmen stretched and broke and the anchor pins were too weak and short. So our team of consulting engineers, rocket scientists and snowmen experts worked feverishly for about three minutes to determine the solution. We purchased 250 military-grade tent pegs and 2,000 feet of plastic polymer twine. On December 11 a number of volunteers and I completed a retrofit.

#### SOUNDS LIKE A GREAT SUCCESS

Response from the community was verwhelmingly positive. Even the folks in Florida thought it was great. Pat Whittingham's video of the lighting party went VIRAL!







#### **LESSONS LEARNED?**

I loved the way the whole street came together. Ballantrae folks have great spirit. One day two little girls knocked on our door and thanked us with cookies. Another night I heard a grandfather walking along with his granddaughter and he began singing Christmas carols. If you decide to move from Ballantrae, leave your snowman in the garage for the new neighbours.

#### WHAT'S THE PLAN FOR 2017?

I'll go back to the few homes that did not participate last year and I will also call upon any new owners to explain the program. I guess I'll be buying more snowmen. The plan is to light them up on December 1 and have another pep rally party.



# A Titanic Undertaking By Henning Halvorsen

Condo 2 residents, Henning and DJ Halvorsen, are well known for their generosity in donating time and crafts to community events. Impressed by Henning's woodworking skill, I was even more intrigued to learn of his project to build a 200:1 detailed scale model of the ill-fated Cunard luxury ocean liner, *S.S. Titanic*.

#### What is your woodworking background?

I'm a tool and die maker by trade. I started my five-year apprenticeship in Denmark at the tender age of 14, in 1942. In public school I had my first taste of woodworking. I was quite good at it and made a number of different pieces for family and friends. I immigrated to Canada in 1956 and got a job as a tool and die maker. In 1964, I started my own business and sold it 27 years later when I retired in 1991. Two years after my so-called retirement, I got involved with designing equipment for special applications for a company in Scarborough. It was supposed be a part-time job, but often turned out to be a fulltime occupation.

I finally retired for good in 2015.

**Tell us about your venture into building models.** I built my first model in 1992 after my retirement. It was a four-masted schooner — one metre-long





training vessel for the Spanish navy. It took me 280 hours to complete but it was not seaworthy, just a model.

#### What were the challenges with the Titanic?

In late 2015 I got itchy for another project and decided on a model of the *Titanic*. I had the kit flown in from California. It contained over 2000 pieces. It's fully operational by remote control. I did not have any experience with remote operation, but with the help of Great Hobbies, I gained the necessary knowledge.

The worst part of the construction was probably trying to curve all the planks to the skeleton, and then sealing it with special glue and paper. After that, the second planking had to be done. It's a tedious job that requires a lot of patience sometimes even frustrating. I'm sure a few swear words were whispered! The ballast was a real

challenge. The only place I could find that carried the lead pellets needed (about four to five kg) was in England. I ordered them, but the airline refused to carry the package (I suppose they thought it was suspicious ). I then found a company in Stoney Creek that extrudes lead, but they had a minimum charge of \$150.00. After discussion, they suggested buckshot pellets and offered a 25-pound bag free if I sent them a picture of the completed model.

*Titanic* took me 350 hours to complete. It has been balanced with the ballast and waterline, but has not yet been tested in the water using the remote control. I am hopeful that I can get permission to try it in the BGCC salt water pool.

T'was a great 2017 for pickleball in Stouffville. We had 213 members, more than any other year, thus making the Stouffville Pickleball Players the largest racquet club in Stouffville.

Despite the rain, we were able to play almost every scheduled day: Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Saturday between 10:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. and Monday and Thursday from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. in Vandorf Park. This year the Town recognized the importance of pickleball and agreed to paint lines for eight pickleball courts on the two tennis courts. This provided a better surface than the deteriorating pickleball courts on the outdoor hockey rink.

We run a "self-directed program" whereby the players in attendance set up and take down their own nets which only takes a couple of minutes.

There is no fee, but we ask for a donation to pay for equipment and food at our socials. This year we had eight well-attended socials, including a special BBQ to celebrate Canada's 150th birthday, plus strawberry ice cream and pizza socials.

With more courts to play on, we raised money and purchased more equipment, more balls, four complete sets of nets and four replacement nets. Due to the generosity of the Stouffville Pickleball Players, we were able to raise over \$1,050.

Pickleball has become so popular that there were many days when all eight courts were being used with more

players waiting. There are opportunities for all levels of players. Last spring, we gave beginner lessons. After a half hour of instruction most players were ready to play a fun game and by the end of the lesson most players were ready to play with the social group. 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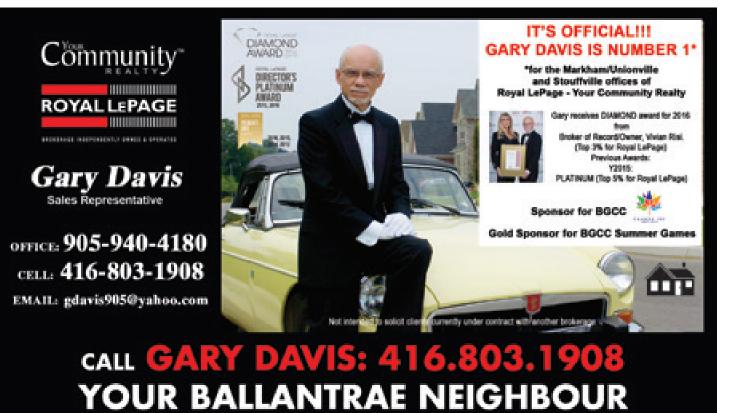
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## **Book Babes of Ballantrae** Visit the Lucy Maud Montgomery Historical Site



### Lucy Maud Montgomery OBE 1874 - 1942

Published in 1908, Anne of Green Gables has long enchanted readers young and old alike. Most of us read about Anne's adventures in fictional Avonlea when we were in our early teens, or even younger.

As the home where Montgomery wrote most of her Anne of Green Gables series was situated in nearby Leaskdale, Ontario, the BB of B (Book Babes of Ballantrae) decided that our June book selection would be Anne of Green Gables. We would read about Anne's adventures through adult eyes and then visit the Montgomery home.

Maud, as she was known, was a published author in her own right before she met and married the Reverend Ewan MacDonald who had a church in P.E.I. Maud had been born and had lived most of her life in P.E.I. before they came to live in Leaskdale in 1911. Her years in Leaskdale were full of both joy and sorrow. It was here that she gave birth to three sons, one of whom died in childbirth. Also, it is where her husband's mental health began to deteriorate. However, the spiritual beauty of the rolling hills of Ontario stoked her story-telling creativity as she conceived and brought to life the very precocious but delightful young girl, Anne Shirley.

As readers, we experience Anne's bubbling personality, her uplifting thoughts, and her long-winded stints of dialogue. Very quickly readers fall in love with this young orphan girl who is being raised by Matthew and Marilla. Certainly, Anne must be one of the most delightful fictional characters ever created. Despite having spent the first ten years of her life in an orphanage, Anne approaches life enthusiastically, seeking and building friendships. She views her "life cup" as always being half-full. The dialogue Montgomery writes for her contains so many wonderful quotes that each one of us could take them all to heart. One of my favourites is, "Dear old world...you are very lovely, and I am glad to be alive in you." We can all say, Amen! to that.

If you read Anne of Green Gables as a child, or if you have never read about her at all, give yourself a treat and delight in the adventures of this scrawny, redhead who is both loving and bright and wild with imagination. Share with Anne the wondrous discoveries she makes during her "raptured voyages of exploration."

A visit to the Lucy Maud Montgomery historical site is a must for everyone who has ever read any of Montgomery's 20 novels, 530 short stories, 500 poems, autobiography, 30 essays and her daily journals, which have also been published. To quote Montgomery, "I cannot remember the time when I was not writing, or when I did not mean to be an author."

The historical site in Leaksdale is open daily during July and August. However, you may visit at any time during the year by calling 905-862-0808 for an appointment.

### Table Tennis BY ALISON SCOWCROFT

Have you ever wondered about the origin of table tennis? I did some research and found a couple of explanations of how table tennis came to be. This version is my favourite. Table tennis was invented in England in the 19th century. Upper class Brits, who played outdoor tennis in the summer, were looking for something fun to do during the bad weather. So someone came up with the bright idea of using the dinner table with books set up as a net, cigar box lids for paddles and champagne corks for balls. They called it whiff-whaff, because of the sound the "balls" made.

Around 1901, James Gibb, who was a fanatical whiffwhaff player visited the U.S. and came back with a celluloid ball. Using this ball changed the sound of the game, so it was nicknamed ping pong. Suddenly ping pong became a commercial success and soon it was trademarked. When an international federation was formed, they couldn't call it ping pong because of the trademark, so they called it the International Table Tennis Federation. This marked the separation between ping pong, the commercial game and table tennis, the sport.

In 2007, Horst Garbe organized and still plays in the BGCC Table Tennis Club, now run by Art Stefan. It is unique from some of the other BGCC clubs, in that the equipment, including the tables, is owned by the members and not by the Recreation Centre. Because of this, the owners do not allow the use of the tables by non-members. However, there is a proposal looking for approval requesting that the Recreation Centre purchase the tables and equipment. This would allow more people to use the equipment at different times. Although most members own their own paddles, which





can run in price from \$30 to \$300-plus, there are spare paddles for guests to use.

The current membership is ten people, all of them men. Come on ladies!!!

They play Tuesdays and Fridays from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m., and hope to add a third day to open it up to beginners. The members pay a \$20 fee twice a year to help with equipment maintenance and the cost of purchasing balls and related equipment.

The club follows the current international rules of play. Generally, they play doubles to accommodate more people. With some basic training, anyone can pick up the sport and begin having fun right from the start. It's a great way to spend a couple of hours, socializing, being physically active, and having fun!

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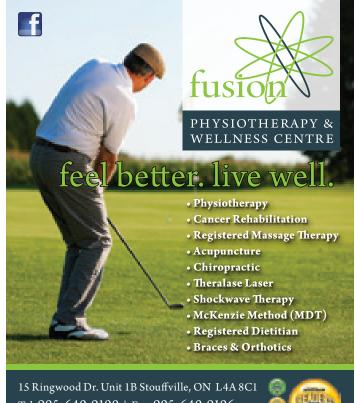
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# A Mother's Pride BY LYNNE BALFOUR

Imagine how proud we would be if our son or daughter were awarded one of Canada's highest awards for service to our country.

This was the news that our neighbour Marlene Robitaille received some months ago. Her son Ray was to be awarded the Order of Merit of Police Forces for his outstanding years of service in both police and military. Canada has several awards for outstanding service. The Order of Merit, designated by the Queen, is the highest award, which Ray received in 2017. (The Order of Canada is the Canadian National Award established in 1967.) The Order of Merit of Police Forces was established in 2000 and is awarded for outstanding long-term service on a national basis.

Ray Robitaille is Deputy Chief of the Calgary Police Service, having served there for 27 years. His duties have included undercover work, supervision of the drug investigation team, police sniper, commander of the public safety unit, and forming nation-wide relations with other agencies. This included being a member of the Triservice Emergency Management Committee of the Canadian Association of Chiefs of Police. Ray spent time as a NATO police advisor during a training mission in Afghanistan. He has received many awards for leadership, lifesaving and community service in Calgary. He has also received special medals from NATO, the USA and Afghanistan for his police service, as well as the Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medal in 2012.

In May 2017 Ray's family was present at Rideau Hall as the award winners were marched in. Each recipient was presented with a distinctive medal by Governor-General David Johnston. It is a cross with a red maple leaf in the centre, topped by a crown, hanging from a blue and gold striped ribbon. Ray said he was very humbled as he felt he was just doing his job.

In true Canadian fashion, Marlene and Ray's extended family celebrated with a family bonfire and singsong accompanied by four family guitarists. It was a proud and memorable time for a national hero.

















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
