

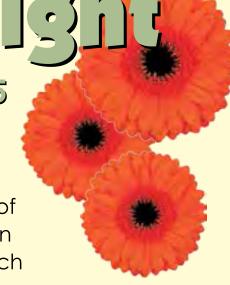

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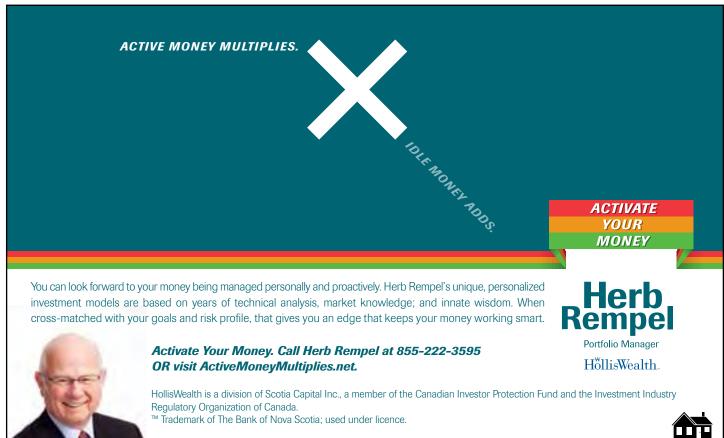
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#### A MESSAGE FROM THE PUBLISHER

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# A MESSAGE FROM OUR COUNCILLOR MORE FROM MAURICE



I was truly humbled by the municipal election results of last October in which I was elected your Councillor for Ward 2.

In order to be elected to a public office you must have the drive and commitment to work diligently and to make available the time required. You must also surround yourself with people who are prepared to provide their own time and efforts for you to achieve your goal. To my wife Jane and to the campaign team I was fortunate to have around me, I owe a heartfelt thank you for their outstanding support and work.

Whitchurch-Stouffville is divided into six wards. Through the municipal election process one councillor is elected to represent each ward. The seventh member of council is the mayor who is elected by all voters within the town.

Ward 2's northern boundary is Davis Drive from Highway 48 to the York-Durham Line. Its eastern boundary is York-Durham Line south from Davis Drive to midway between Hillsdale Drive and Bloomington Road. The southern line extends west from York-Durham Line along Vandorf Road to McCowan Road. Then the western boundary follows McCowan Road from Vandorf Road to St. John's Side Road where the line jogs east to Highway 48 and north to Davis Drive.

A high percentage of Ward 2 residents live within the confines of Ballantrae Golf & Country Club. It is however, a very diverse ward in that it also encompasses many local farm communities, the area around Musselman's Lake and the original homes of the community of Ballantrae.

There is a role for the media to play in any attempt to have voters come out to cast their ballots. However, I believe the people most responsible for a greater voter turnout are the candidates themselves. The total voter turnout for all of Whitchurch-Stouffville was approximately 47%. The Ward 2 turnout was 58.4%. In BGCC over 82% of eligible voters cast a ballot. You are all to be commended for your interest and efforts in this democratic process.

Phil Bannon was the ward representative on council for the past eleven years. He represented our community well over that time, as only a person who has attended so many council meetings could attest, and we should thank him for his service and wish him well in future endeavours.

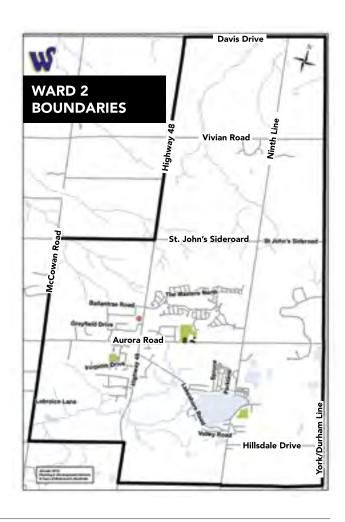
Of the seven members elected to the current Town Council, five, including the Mayor, are first-timers in their roles. Needless to say we have a lot to learn but all are keen supporters of Whitchurch-Stouffville and will endeavour to live up to the expectations of the voters who saw fit to put us there.

The first two or three months of Council meetings have been taken up with orientation matters, meeting the staff and learning who plays what role. We have also held preliminary budget meetings to give town staff guidance as to which items the new council would like in the budget for 2015.

Further, there are committee appointments to be made. Generally speaking each councillor sits on at least two subcommittees of Council. As I have a keen interest in the local library, having served as a public representative on the Library Board for the past eight years, I have requested that I now serve on that same board as a councillor.

The Town produces a booklet each year which contains information about waste management and waste collection dates for our area. These were delivered through Canada Post. If you have a "No unaddressed mail" label on your mail box, your copy would not have been left. I have therefore brought copies of this important booklet to the BGCC Recreation Centre. Just ask at reception for your copy.

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# The Global Economic Forum... and More Food for Thought



One of the goals of our Ballantrae Golf & Country Club Recreation Centre is to facilitate wellness in all phases of life, including mental fitness. To that end there are many enticing programs here.

One of the most interesting is a twice-monthly discussion/speakers group called the Global Economic Forum, a formal title loosely interpreted by the organizers. It was started by a group of men on the treadmills in the BGCC gym discussing various issues on the TV news. They decided that since they hadn't solved the world's problems at the end of their workouts, and since there was no neighbourhood Tim Horton's, they would bring their coffee to our Recreation Centre and continue their discussions. Of course there are many people in our community with fascinating and wide-ranging experience. Many have been requested to speak on their area of expertise. The breadth of the topics covered has been amazing.

This year speakers have included, among others, John McLellan (the business of golf course operation), Doug McIntyre (taking a company public), Gil Scott (the business of sports), Ian Rosenfeldt (career skills needed in the 21st century), Herb Rempel (the bond market and economic indicators), Glenn Crosby (commercial real estate), Bill Balfour (provision of fresh water—local and global) and Dan Fearon (high frequency trading).

Both Helena Jaczek, our MPP and Paul Calandra, our MP, were impressive in speaking about their roles in the provincial and federal parliaments. Future topics will include the economics of education (Karl Kinzinger), economics 101 (John Graham), and socialism vs. capitalism (Bernard Downes).

The intent of this group is to have a discussion. They meet the second and fourth Wednesday of each month (September-May) at 9:30 a.m. in the Recreation Centre. One meeting is a discussion of a specific topic; the next features a speaker. It is open to all BGCC residents. If you or a neighbour want to suggest an interesting topic or speaker, the organizers would be glad to hear from you.

Beyond this group, (and outside of physical activities), there are many groups that might be of interest. Bridge, euchre and other card games, bingo and Mah Jongg, book clubs, choir, quilting and stitch'n chat are weekly events. On top of those events, there are regular social events usually held at our Recreation Centre.

Many Ballantrae people support our local theatres in Stouffville, Markham, Aurora, and Newmarket. The York Symphony is wonderful. The University of Toronto sponsors a fall and spring lecture series at the Markham Council Chambers, with a wide range of topics ranging from history to architecture, science to literature.

No matter where your interests lie, be sure to participate in these nearby events. They are certainly worth your time!

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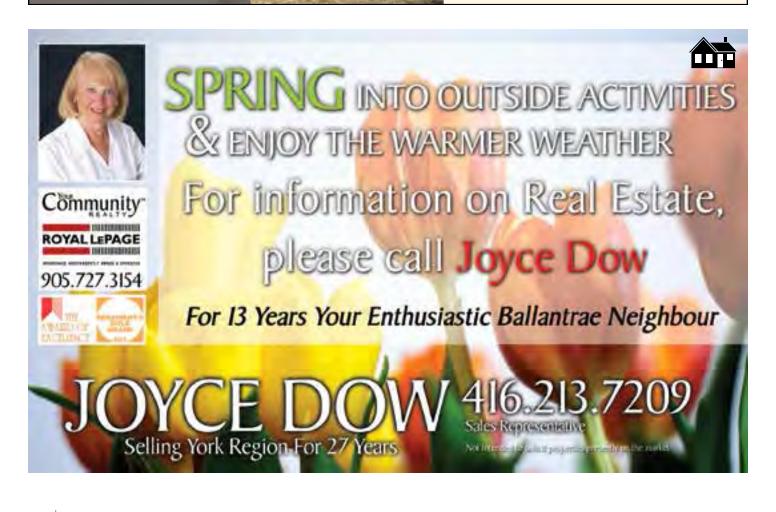

# Prepare and Train Smart for the Upcoming Summer Games



The bi-annual Summer Games create a culture of community, a sense of belonging, fun, enthusiasm and competition. Research indicates that strong social engagement and participation in activities you enjoy contributes to successful aging.

We have all heard the saying, "use it or lose it." It's very true. A consistent physical activity regimen is another component of successful aging.

What is your current fitness regimen? Do you have a Physical Activity Plan? If the answer is no, contact me, your Wellness Director, to evaluate your fitness level and to get you started on your plan.

Whatever your activity level, it's never too late to start. Consistency is the key. Maintaining a certain level of fitness is important so that you do not predispose yourself to injuries when you overdo a sport, especially during the games! It's important to get out and maintain a level of fitness at least every couple of days, because if you are not stimulating your muscles regularly you are at a higher risk of injury. The longer you are inactive, the longer you need to warm up to avoid injury. Remember that you also need to spend time in the cool-down phase so that you don't build up lactate and other by-products of a heavy workout. Stretching is very important.

As your Wellness Director, I will offer event-specific preparation sessions in late spring/early summer of 2015. These sessions will include:

- ✓ HOW TO WARM UP WITH DYNAMIC STRETCHING
- ✓ SETTING GOALS
- ✓ STATIC STRETCHING
- ✓ SPORT-SPECIFIC TRAINING

"Fail to prepare, prepare to fail" is one of my favourite quotes. Don't let that happen to you.

# TIPS FOR PREPARING FOR THE GAMES

NOW is the time to think about creating your own plan of action to prepare for the event(s) in which you will participate. Participation and fun are key elements to the success of the games. Whether you are seasoned to your event or a beginner, practice and sport-specific training are necessary. In order to make your preparation fun, safe and successful, keep these 10 key points in mind:

- 1 Set goals: start slowly and build gradually.
- 2 Ensure you have the appropriate attire and gear, specific to your sport/event. Always consider both safety and performance.
- Practise consistently each week.
- 4. Listen to your body as you train/practise. Do not push into pain. Be aware of old injuries.
- 5 Always warm up prior to training for your specific sport, i.e., dynamic stretching to warm up muscles and joints.
- 6 Always cool down after training for your specific sport, i.e., static stretching.
- 7 Fuel your body with nutrient-dense whole foods. Each meal should consist of lean protein, complex carbohydrates and good fats.
- By Hydrate and stay hydrated. Water is key.
- Ocument your progress over the weeks as we get closer to the games.
- 10 Have fun!







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# WITH DOUG CARRICK A ROUND WITH BALLANTRAE'S GOLF COURSE ARCHITECT

Last summer I had the pleasure of playing 18 holes with Doug Carrick, Ballantrae's very own golf course architect. And yes, even Doug has trouble sticking some of our greens. His approach to the first green ran off the left and into the bunker (more on that to come). Doug, one of the nicest guys you'll ever meet, has an impressive portfolio. Some of his designs include Muskoka Bay in Gravenhurst, Bigwin Island in Muskoka and The Carrick in Scotland. He's currently working on the new Lebovik course in Aurora and Friday Harbour at Big Bay Point in Barrie.

#### How did you get started in golf course design?

I was about ten years old when I first caddied for my dad. I loved the game immediately and started to play as an amateur. I soon realized that I was never going to make a living as a pro so I started to take more interest in the design aspect. I took the Landscape Architect Program at the University of Georgia. My first job was with Tom McBroom. In the early 1980s I worked for Robbie Robinson who had worked with Stanley Thompson.

**Tell me about your first round at Ballantrae.** I'll never forget it. On the 15th I shot a hole in one just as John McLellan, the general manager, drove by on a cart. The guys I was playing with were really excited. "Doug got the first ace!" they shouted. John chuckled. "No, it's not the first," he said. "One of the plumbers got one earlier on the fourth." He stole my fire.

What challenges are involved in designing a course such as Ballantrae? My goal was to make it playable and fun for players of average skill but still make it challenging for low handicappers. There's lots of room off the tees but you'll make or break your pars on the greens. I tried to keep people's backyards out of the line of fire but a few places got squeezed, especially in Condo 5 on number 16.

What's the signature hole? I tend not to have just one signature hole; instead I try to create 18 good ones and make each distinctive. It would be tough for me to name a signature hole here at Ballantrae—probably the one on which I make par or birdie.

**Let's talk about your greens.** My folks used to live here; in fact my dad and his pal, Bill Burrow, started the Men's League. My dad got razzed about the greens all the time. "Tell your son he's a sadist," his buddies would say. Actually, the greens here were modelled after Pinehurst 2. The secret to sticking them? A high and soft approach.

What were your marching orders from Gus Schickedanz? Gus wasn't a golfer. The only course he'd ever been on was Augusta National. I took him over to see Osprey, a course I designed in Orangeville but he commented that it was not what he wanted. He said it "looked like the moon" and preferred Ballantrae to be "totally natural like Augusta" with no earth moved. That's funny because Augusta is far from natural. Now that I think about it, most of my clients have never played golf. That probably makes my job easier.

**Do you have a favourite golf course?** No, but everything Stanley Thompson designed is good. I'm a member of Summit, his course in Richmond Hill.

What pro golfers do you like? One of my favourites is Ricky Fowler. He has a nice demeanour and he's good for the game.

Where would your ultimate golf holiday take you? To the highlands of Scotland. I love that countryside.

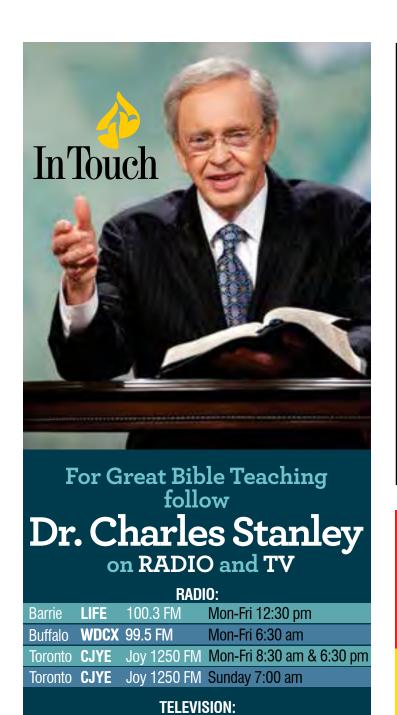

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# Buy More & Pay Less

Our holiday shopping is behind us and the bills have been paid. Looking back with a critical eye, how many of us have maximized our purchases and minimized our costs? Is it possible to buy more items; and in fact, pay less? Let's examine some of the ways.

Many services, especially telecommunications, can be bundled to save money. Purchase more services from one company and you can obtain significant savings. Another tactic is to negotiate "loyalty discounts" with these same service providers. Each year, I call my service provider to discuss better deals offered by other companies and ask why I should remain with my current company. I was able to negotiate my current deal which includes a significant discount off television, internet, and home phone services. In addition, I received an upgrade to "fibre" (faster internet), an additional 200 GB of internet download capability, a PVR, an enhanced combination modem/router, advanced technical support, and a paper invoice – all free. Free, except for the (ugh) 1.5 hours on the phone.

Many of us rent items we could otherwise buy. Consider your water heater and the fact that you have been paying a monthly rental (\$13-\$26) for all of these years. How often has it needed servicing, let alone replacement? Consider purchasing your rental water heater from Enbridge or replacing it with a new purchased unit. Depending on its age, you may pay as little as a few hundred dollars for your existing unit. In over forty years of owning a home, I have had one service call and have never replaced a water heater. However, never, ever, purchase a water heater from a door-to-door salesperson.

Other items that are cheaper to buy than to rent are television digital boxes, PVRs, modems, and routers. The breakeven point is 1-2+ years and for a few dollars a month, you can obtain replacement protection just as you have for your rental boxes.

Many retailers offer "BOGO" (Buy One Get One) deals; however, I hear people saying that they don't need two of these items. Why not combine with another person to obtain these deals. I even did this once in the store with a stranger. Eyeglasses, shoes, clothing, golf, and restaurants are just a few of the deals.

By purchasing more at designated times, you can achieve considerable savings. We all know about Boxing Day, Black Friday, and Cyber Monday, but many retailers also have warehouse sales to rid themselves of excess inventory. Be wary of trendy or "end of line" goods.

Purchasing more goods online will save money. Further savings can be achieved by having the retailer ship gifts directly to the recipient. (Refer to my previous article on online purchasing in the March 2014 issue). Websites such as Groupon and WagJag offer discounts on many items. Take advantage of these discounts to purchase items already on your list or to try a new but expensive restaurant at half the normal price.

"Buy Now, Pay Later" is a tactic that only favours the seller. Purchasing big ticket items with cash or debit is much cheaper in the long run, than leasing, renting, or buying on credit. There are some legitimate "interest free" purchases but be cautious. Failure to complete the "interest free" payments on time, could result in a hefty interest charge being applied right back to the beginning. Negotiate an upfront cash discount as a better alternative.

As a Canadian, I am reluctant to offer this last suggestion, but as a consumer, I would be remiss not to mention it. If you are a regular traveller, you are already saving money by purchasing more goods in the US. Not everything is cheaper so do your research first, and you too can save 50% to 90% on many items. Remember to consider the exchange rate and sales tax differences. For snowbirds in Florida, the product must be 28% cheaper to break even (21% when taking the sales tax difference between Florida and Ontario into account) given a 78 cent Canadian dollar. At the moment, the Canadian dollar is extremely volatile so check the current exchange rate prior to making a purchase. Cross border shoppers must also factor in the cost of travel.

By buying more and renting less, by bundling purchases, and by buying more at the right time and place, we can all save money or if you're so inclined, afford even more purchases.

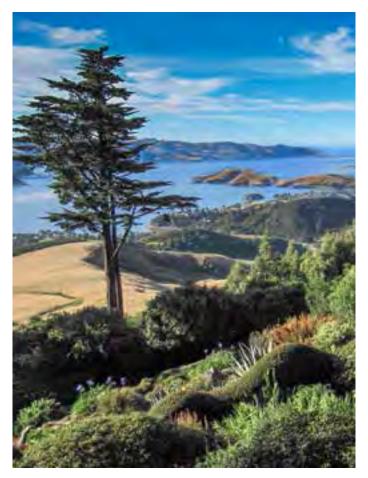

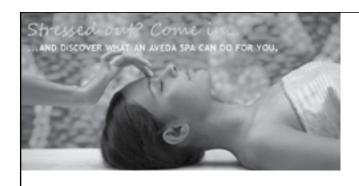
### Men's Night Out

## Nassau Chop Suey

Last November, Hubby and I went on another cruise, a repositioning one from Barcelona to Miami. After the usual overeating and drinking and the unusual couple of rough sea days, we arrived at Nassau in the Bahamas, our last port of call before disembarkation in Miami. (Do real sailors use such words as disembarkation or just cruisers?)

It was a beautiful day, and from our port side right next to town, Nassau looked very inviting with brightly painted buildings and the sounds of steel drums. We had visited many years before, but decided we needed an update on the place. How were we to know we were one of five ships in port that day, all of them bigger than ours, with two being quite gigantic?

Soon we were part of the hordes of tourists streaming through the port gate into chaos. Adding to the confusion was the construction of new facilities as Nassau readied herself for the upcoming winter season. Wending our way through the crowd, past colourful souvenir huts in our search for a cab tour, we were corralled and herded into a van driven by "Sexy Mary." Our fellow passengers were six young people from China.

I protested that this might not be a good fit, as I was slow getting around and might hold younger people up, but my objections were brushed aside and before I knew it, we were leaving the congestion of the port for the congestion of the streets.

"Sexy Mary" was quite a character, about to be forty-nine the next week. Her short-cropped hair had orange-dyed spikes on top. She was nicely turned out in a navy pantsuit with a crisp white blouse, and loads of bracelets and rings. She told us she was called sexy to distinguish her from the other Mary driver, and because her husband, who also worked as a tour guide, was "Sexy Perry."

Moving at a snail's pace, our tour took us past the usual churches and government buildings as I translated for the Chinese people. (You didn't know I spoke Chinese, did you?) Actually, they all spoke varying levels of English, but couldn't quite understand "Sexy Mary's" Bahamian accent. The young girl sitting next to me kept asking what Mary had said. I repeated as best I could, and she told the others in Chinese.

After a visit to a fort, straw market and rum cake store, Mary told us she was taking us "into the hood," but it was okay as she had grown up there, and everybody knew her. How do you explain "the hood" to a young Chinese tourist, as she looks at you inquiringly? I told her we were going into a rough section of town where poor black people lived and where it was not safe to go at night. Her look changed from inquiring to apprehensive. I might have been nervous myself, had not Mary already proved herself to be very capable and an excellent driver.

The "hood" was pretty primitive: many people with no running water forced to use the community taps curb side. There were lots of people about, all talking, laughing and drinking in the laid-back style of the Caribbean. Mary showed us her school and church with genuine pride in her heritage. I imagine it was a kinder, gentler "hood" than found in some American cities.

Next on our route, we made a giant leap to affluence as we crossed over the bridge to Paradise Island. We were out of the hood but back in the horde, as taxis dumped out their passengers to window shop in Atlantis. The Chinese kids all met up on time as Mary had instructed, slightly shell shocked at the prices of things.

On the return trip, it took us quite a while to get back inside the port. Nassau is not built to accommodate such a tourist horde. All the while, Mary chattered away to us and to the other drivers, laughing and joking and keeping us entertained. I asked her about Sir Harry Oakes, the Canadian millionaire who was murdered in Nassau when the Duke and Duchess of Windsor were there during the Second World War. This was news to Mary, but she insisted I share the info with our Chinese, and told me she would happily include the story in her next tour.

By the time we returned, most cruisers had the same idea and were squeezing back through the gate to the ships. Elbows up, we ambled through, satisfied we had "done" Nassau and feeling kinda lucky to have had such a fun experience. See, you never know what an adventure awaits!

"Smoked food requires a lot of care in every step from the brining and curing to the marinades," says Waye. He also takes pride in the fact that everything—from the cornbread to barbecue sauce to the house-smoked bacon—is made from scratch.

The menu changes to suit the seasons but signature dishes, such as coffee-rubbed slowly-smoked brisket, crispy honey fried chicken and both pork and beef ribs are always available. ## The Winery

## "A meal without wine is like a day without sun."

If this quote resonates with you, and you want to visit a Canadian winery without driving all the way to Niagara, take a short trip to the family-owned Gallucci Winery, situated on the Ninth Line, south of Bloomington.

Winemaking was a passionate hobby for Paolo Gallucci, an entrepreneur of 40 years in the meat business. His daughters, Anne Marie Piro, Sonya Sacchetti and Michelle Riccio had always wanted to follow in their dad's footsteps as entrepreneurs, but in a field more appealing than meat! So they persuaded Mr. Gallucci to create another business venture involving his hobby. He saw the potential and was delighted at the thought of leaving a legacy in the wine industry.

Gallucci Winery opened in September 2014 with 15 acres of vines, producing such wines as Frontenac, Baco Noir and Vidal. The vines had been planted nearly five years previously. The family hired a Hungarian winemaker to advise on such details as ideal harvesting times and balancing the wines' acidity levels. Anne Marie and Sonya run the business on a day-to-day basis.

The winery restaurant is open for lunch, serving paninis, cheese platters, pizzas and salads. Gallucci also has an event room for up to 75 people plus a gazebo on the grounds for weddings and other summer events. Weddings are already booked for 2015 and 2016! Tours, which include tastings, are held regularly for those interested in sampling their wares.

So for a new spot for a nice quiet lunch, give Gallucci a try!

Some people choose to act as "spares." She assured me it's social and relaxed, and it runs all year. Some participants don't play in winter and/or summer due to going south or being on the golf course.

Duplicate Bridge, Mondays, 1:00 – 4:00 p.m. Pat Wood: 905-640-9182

This group is for the diehard bridge player, and also has up to six tables, somewhat fewer in winter and summer. Players are asked to contact Pat to be on her roster of regulars (or spares if that is your choice). Players are expected to attend every Monday, unless Pat is advised in advance. There is an occasional small levy for supplies required.



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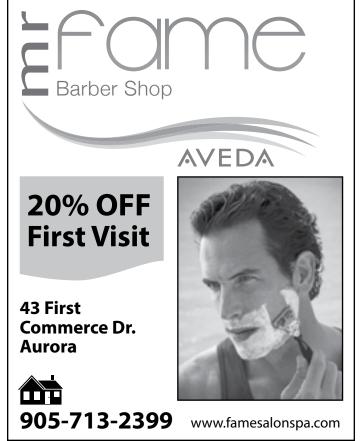
